OUR MISSION

To enrich the lives of children and families and strengthen the East End community by promoting learning through play.

OUR COMMUNITY

The East End of Long Island is one of the most diverse communities in America. Great wealth exists alongside great privation where one out of seven children live in poverty. The area has a higher percentage of immigrants than Suffolk County as a whole. According to the 2010 census, Spanish-speaking immigrants composed over 15% of the year-round population, which was 50% more than their percentage of the population of Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Last year, the percentage of Latino students in East End primary schools exceeded 35%.

OUR HISTORY

CMEE's founders believed the East End was in critical need of an educational resource serving families of all backgrounds. Beginning in 2000, CMEE offered multi-disciplinary classes and workshops at several locations across the East End. The response was overwhelming and CMEE opened its permanent home in Bridgehampton, New York in October 2005.

OUR VISITORS

- CMEE's audience is composed primarily of families with children aged 1 to 8 years old.
- Over 60,000 visitors each year who hail from 41 of the 50 states across the country, which makes CMEE one of the most visited museums in Eastern Long Island.
- 2,100+ Members who average one visit every six weeks. 72% of CMEE's members hail from the East End.
- Over 200 East End families who receive scholarships to visit CMEE and participate in its classes and workshops free of charge.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

CMEE regularly collaborates with social service agencies and other community organizations to help serve the needs of families in the East End. In the past year, some of CMEE's partners include the **Bridgehampton Historical Society**, the **Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreation Center**, **Literacy Suffolk**, **Long Island Head Start**, **The Retreat**, which provides support for victims of domestic abuse, the **Flying Point Foundation for Autism**, and the **Suffolk County Fatherhood Initiative**.

FACILITY INFORMATION

Permanent Gallery: 3,600 square feet

Interactive exhibits focus on what makes the East End a special place, emphasizing its people, flora, and fauna. Themes include agriculture, fishing, world celebrations, and community. Designed in collaboration with Lee Skolnick Design + Partnership.

Changing Exhibition Gallery: 1,125 square feet

Currently, CMEE is using the space to promote the development of gross motor skills through active and imaginative play. When not using the Gallery as an interactive play space, CMEE installs temporary exhibits specifically intended to meet the needs of families in the East End. Past exhibits include: *Fun 2, 3, 4*, which was designed to show how math is used in everyday life. *CMEE in My Community* featured local community organizations like the Animal Rescue Fund and the Riverhead Foundation for Marine Research and Preservation and *En Mi Familia*, a bilingual exhibit intended to increase awareness of Mexican-American cultural traditions through the art of Carmen Lomas Garza.

Outdoor Amphitheater

From April to October, CMEE hosts a series of performances from puppet shows to musical performances to theater productions by local students in its 300-seat amphitheater.

Classes and Workshops

Throughout the year, CMEE offers classes and workshops for children ages 2 to 7 in science, art, music, sports, and gardening. CMEE also works with its partners to present programs for children with autism, ESOL learners, and other families with specific needs.

CURRICULUM ENHANCEMENT

- School Field Trips and Outreach Programs meet the New York State Learning Standards and the new Core Curriculum.
- Pre and post-visit materials and activities for teachers to use in their classrooms.
